Wake Forest-Wisconsin Notes

- The Deacs have played more neutral site games in Charlotte than any other place.
  - The Duke's Mayo Bowl marked the 27th time the Deacs have played a neutral site game in Charlotte and has a record of 15-12.
  - Bowl Game History in Charlotte:

- Wednesday marked the first time Wake Forest has played Wisconsin in program history.
  - Wake Forest has a 4-12 all-time record against Big Ten opponents.
  - The Demon Deacons own victories over Indiana (2016), Purdue (2002) and two wins over Northwestern (1996, 1997).

- Jaquarii Roberson tied a bowl recorded with three receiving touchdowns in the game. He joined Olamide Zaccheaus (UVA, 2018), Christian Kirk (Texas A&M, 2017) and Hakeem Nicks (UNC, 2008).

### Team Notes

- Entering Wednesday, the Deacs 12 interceptions and 1.50 per game which ranked fifth in FBS.
  - Nick Andersen tallied the 13th of the season on Wednesday and the fourth of his freshman season.
  - Nine different players have an interception this season.
  - Last season, Wake Forest was one of six FBS teams with 10 or more players who intercepted a pass.
- Wake Forest has continually set offensive records over the past four seasons and 2020 was no different. 2020 was no different as the Deacs set a new program record for points per game with an average of 36.0 on the season. This included a pair of 50-plus point performances against Campbell (64 points) and North Carolina (53 points).

- Wake Forest totaled 22 rushing touchdowns over the course of nine games in 2020, while the Demon Deacons totaled 18 in 13 contests one season ago.

### Individual Notes

- Wide receiver Jaquarii Roberson continued to prove he is one of the best wide receivers in the ACC and the country. He finished the day with a team-high eight catches for 131 yards and three touchdowns.
  - This marks the sixth consecutive game the redshirt junior has pulled in at least six catches.
  - This is his fourth consecutive game with over 100 or more receiving yards, becoming the first Wake Forest player to do so since Chris Givens in 2011.

- With his three touchdowns on Wednesday, Roberson finished the 2020 season top 10 in single-season receiving touchdowns, becoming the fifth wide receiver in the past four seasons to finish in the top 10 on the list:

- Defensive lineman Miles Fox continued to be a disruptive force in the backfield. On Wednesday, finished his All-ACC season with a tackle and 0.5 tackles-for-loss.
  - Fox, who was nominated for the Piccolo Award (ACC Comeback Player of the Year), has had at least one tackle for loss in sevenx of the Deacs nine games this season including the last five games.
  - His 10.5 tackles for loss on the season are a career-high.
- Nick Andersen secured his fourth interception at the end of the first half. He is just the third player in the Dave Clawson era (Amari Henderson, 4 in 2019; Jesse Bates , 5 in 2016) to snare four INTs in a season. Additionally, Anderson is just the ninth Demon Deacon to accomplish this feat since the turn of the century.
